The Rotary Foundation

The Rotary Foundation, established in 1917, transforms donations into grants awarded to Rotarians for projects that change lives both close to home and around the world. Foundation grants empower our Rotarians to approach challenges such as poverty, illiteracy, and malnutrition with sustainable solutions that leave a lasting impact. Strong financial oversight, stellar financial and transparency ratings, and a unique funding model mean that we make the most of every contribution.

ROTARY'S LEADERSHIP IN POLIO ERADICATION

Rotary launched its polio immunization program, Polio Plus, in 1985. In 1988, Rotary became a spearheading partner of the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative** (GPEI), along with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation later joined the initiative. In the year when the GPEI was launched, there were 350,000 cases of polio in 125 countries. Eradicating this disease is Rotary's top priority.

The Rotary Foundation has committed over \$1.6 billion, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, to banish this paralyzing disease. Globally, we have helped to vaccinate 2.5 billion children, preventing 16 million cases of the disease and the deaths of 1.5 million children. Today, through the efforts of the GPEI partners and Rotary's PolioPlus program, we have reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent. When those last few cases are eliminated, polio will become only the second disease, other than smallpox, that humans have been able to eradicate.
